The Somerset County Library System has been named a Star Library by the preeminent library publication, *Library Journal*.


Library System Director, Jim Hecht said, "This is the second year in a row that we are being honored and I want to recognize our library staff members and our many volunteers for their contribution to this achievement. It is their hard work and dedication that places SCLS among the best libraries in the country." Only 258 libraries throughout the nation have the distinction of being named a Star Library.

This is the second year the *LJ* Index was published. According to *Library Journal*, "The *LJ Index scores measure the levels of library service delivery relative to peer libraries nationally.*"

LJ Index scores are based on four per capita service output statistics: library visits, circulation, program attendance and public Internet computer use.

Last year, SCLS offered 752 programs just for adults and 2,665 programs for youths attended by almost twenty thousand children and teens. This year, like every year yielded impressive summer reading statistics; over six thousand youths registered for summer reading clubs and read over 350,000 books, the highest total of all libraries in New Jersey. The library expects to surpass the 3 million circulation mark sometime this year.

Friends' Concert: Keith Calmes Fri,. January 15 8:00 PM - 9:45 PM




Coming to New Jersey: Immigration & the Garden State Thurs., December 17


The Mystery of the Sunken Locomotives Tues., December 8 7:30 PM
